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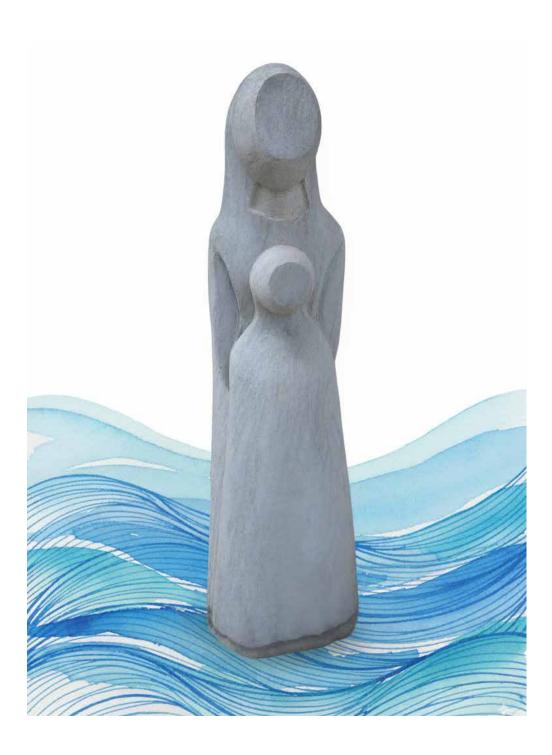

The Indian Institute of Crafts & Design (IICD), Jaipur, was established in 1995 by the Government of Rajasthan as an autonomous institute with the aim of serving as a catalyst for transformation in the craft sector. Since October 2007, the institute has been operated and funded by the Ambuja Educational Institute (AEI) under a Public-Private Partnership (PPP) model.

IICD is affiliated with Vishvakarma Skills University (formerly Rajasthan ILD Skills University), the first government skill university in India, established through an Act of the State Assembly in 2017. The institute offers undergraduate and postgraduate degree programs in various disciplines related to crafts and design.

#### **Chairperson's Message**

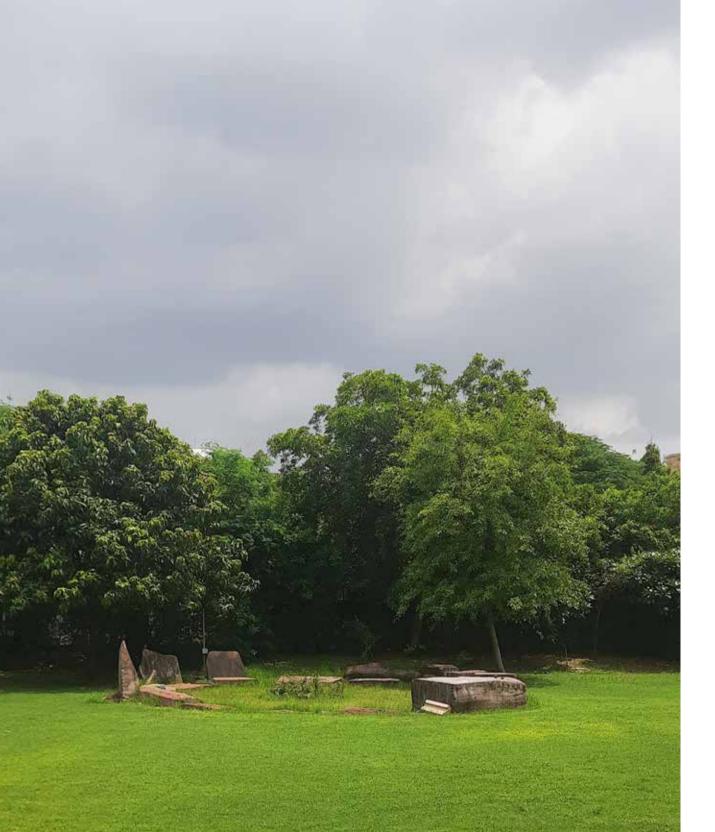

#### **Editor's Message**

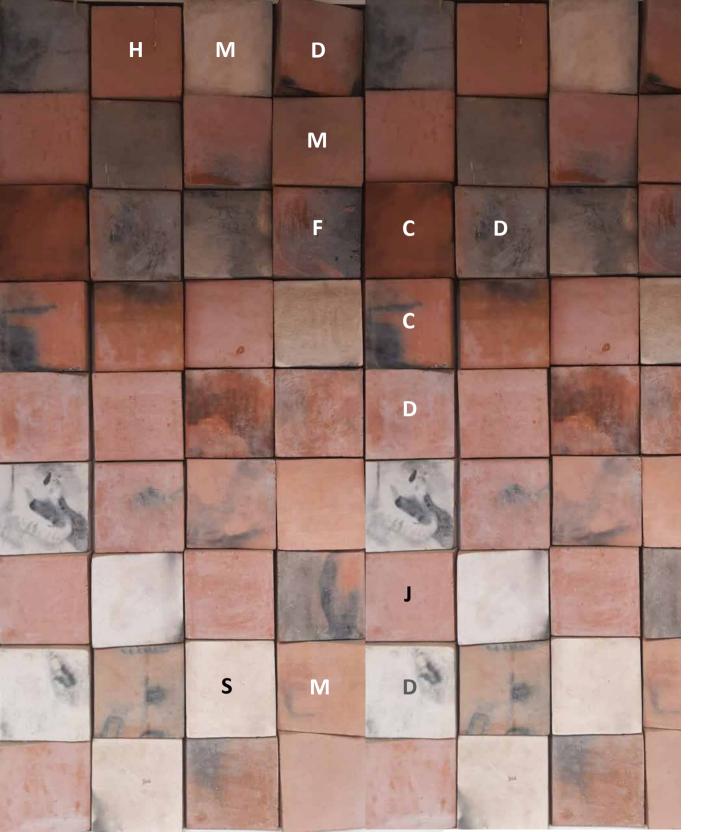

# Soft Material Design

Nirupan 2025



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#### Graduation project

The first, a series of block-printed dresses, draws inspiration from the mesmerizing beauty of stained glass. Tailored with French flair, these pieces are crafted to captivate the sophisticated tastes of the French market, offering a blend of artistry and everyday luxury.

In the second collection, I explored block-printed fabric wallpapers inspired by the bold lines of Cubism. Designed on textured fabrics, these wallpapers transform any space into a gallery of modern art, merging artistic expression with interior design.

















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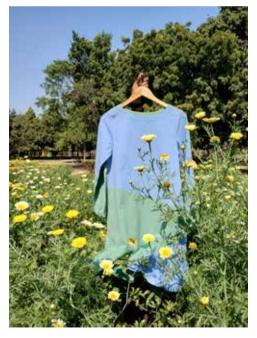
During my graduation project at Doodlage, I created two block-printing collections aligned with the brand's sustainable, experimental ethos.

The first reimagined traditional florals into quirky, doodle-inspired motifs-playful yet refined-using a bold palette of poster blue, bright red, butter yellow, soft pink, and dark green.

The second reinterpreted stripes and checks through wood grain, oak grooves, and birch striations, introducing organic textures into structured patterns.

Beyond print design, I contributed to content creation, photography, modeling, and daily brand activities, gaining end-to-end insight into a sustainable fashion workflow. These projects merged traditional craft with contemporary aesthetics while challenging conventional design norms.











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#### Sustainable Roots

This project unites sustainability, craftsmanship, and cultural heritage through two design initiatives. The first, a lamp collection for the US and UK markets, is handcrafted from eco-friendly paper pulp made from cotton rag waste. Featuring table, floor, pendant, and wall-mounted styles, it blends natural textures, minimalist aesthetics, and artisanal appeal with smart lighting and multifunctionality. The second initiative, Reviving Lac, reimagines traditional lac jewellery for modern trends, targeting urban women aged 18–35. Combining heritage techniques with bold, versatile designs, it uses eco-friendly materials and ethical production practices. Both initiatives promote innovation, recycling, and conscious consumerism, enriching lifestyles with meaningful, beautifully crafted, and sustainable designs.













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#### Extraction of new language from Rabari embroidery

To fully conceptualize Rabari embroidery from traditional to 3D, one must delve into the intricacies of this art form. Rabari embroidery, rooted in the rich textile heritage of the Kutch region, embodies a fusion of cultural motifs and age-old techniques. Transforming this intricate craft into a three-dimensional representation involves erging traditional embroidery patterns with modern 3D design elements. This evolution—from a flat surface to a multidimensional textile creation—requires a deep understanding of both traditional craftsmanship and contemporary design principles. As part of this project, I also worked on a stitch library, documenting and experimenting with various embroidery techniques. My project and inspiration is titled "River of Creativity: Navigating Artistic Journeys with Kutch Artisans." It draws from the topographical views of rivers and landscapes, symbolizing the flow of ideas, traditions, and innovation in textile art.

Created a souvenir range for IITK alumni and worked on one self-sponsored project.









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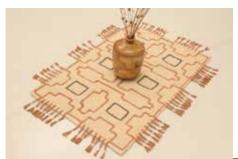
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#### Hue of Ambadi

There are two collections – one in naturally dyed yarn to make six rugs inspired by the stepwells of Rajasthan, which have an important role to play in preserving water or rainwater, and another in natural block-printed cushions inspired by William Morris, viewing nature through his eyes and observing the intricacy of nature in detail and simplifying them into geometric forms to give a fresh look to the natural block-printed cushions for the export market.

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#### Project Rana

The project drew inspiration from the wildlife, nature, and historic architecture of Ranthambore, translating these elements into a luxurious collection of home furnishings. The design process was deeply influenced by the region's majestic landscapes and architectural heritage, reflected in every detail of the products. The collection included bedsheets, pillow covers, cushions, and quilts, created for Vyom by Shuchita's high-end clientele. A key feature of the design process was the incorporation of hand embroidery on the cushions, adding depth and texture to the wildlife- and nature-inspired motifs.

Embrace the effortless charm of the 1970s with Mayday's Retro Revival collection – a celebration of laid-back elegance and timeless style.



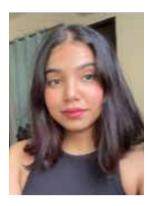












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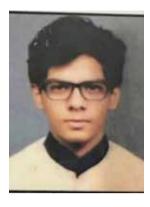

By establishing connections with local and national markets and creating an online presence, we aim to introduce contemporary Lambani-inspired accessories and home décor items that appeal to modern consumers.

The shirts are crafted using block-printing techniques, which allow for the precise and detailed application of the geometric and rhythmic motifs.

The collection involves embroidery and screen-printing processes, and the inspiration comes from tropical flowers and leaves. 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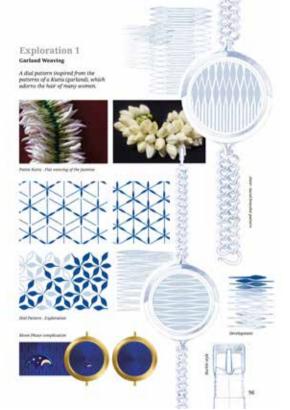

This project embarked on a captivating exploration of timekeeping through the lens of the Kanjeevaram weaving technique. The focus centered on designing a watch that embraced rich cultural heritage. The watch transcended mere functionality, becoming an Artifact of Auspiciousness. More than mere adornment, Kanjeevaram captures cultural significance, prosperity, and heritage. The project delved into the intricate relationship between the craft's motifs, textures, and colors, and their symbolic association with auspiciousness. Research on the cultural perception of life and the inherent link to Kanjeevaram formed the foundation for a unique collection. The resulting collection, Malligai: Aura of the Jasmine, served as a bridge between centuries-old artistry and contemporary watchmaking, offering a captivating expression of timekeeping imbued with cultural significance.









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### **Dark Luxe Collection**

Dark Luxe is a collection that blends simple luxury with the allure of deep, shadowy tones. Crafted from dark, tinted wood with brass accents, each piece embodies elegance, refinement, and quiet opulence. The interplay of dark wood and brass inlay creates a timeless aesthetic – simple in form, yet elevated through detail and materiality. The collection maintains a balance between contemporary style and time-honored craftsmanship, ensuring each piece complements the others with subtle harmony. The deep, moody palette, accented with warm metallic highlights was chosen to evoke an atmosphere of mystery and sophistication. Dark Luxe is for those who value understated luxury, where every curve, surface, and finish is considered. It is a collection where darkness meets sophistication, and where design speaks through both restraint and richness.

















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### **MARODI**

This project documents Marodi metal embossing from Moradabad, tracing its decline from intricate tradition to diluted mass-produced copies. Filmed over a week with craftsman Mr. Ilyas, the documentary captures both artistry and hardship, as practitioners risk eyesight and livelihood while preserving a craft now nearing extinction in modern India.

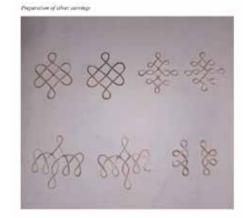






















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### The journey of silver jewellery

My project involved creating patio furniture for the House of Leon, taking their existing Provence collection as my muse.

My collection, Elegance Moderne, is a patio bar furniture collection that consists of a bar counter, stool, and a cart with a wine rack as an accessory. I took the aesthetics of the Provence collection as inspiration, yet managed to give it my personal touch—making it the same but different.







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### **Gathering of Elegance**

The brief given by the studio is to design a client-based living room product range using mango wood and cane. The materials can be used in any capacity for the development of the products, which are intended for residential purposes. The products should be functional, high quality, with an emphasis on sustainable and environmentally friendly materials.

Key points for the furniture: Minimal

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### Incredible Handicrafts and Minerals

I have made two pieces of furniture for my graduation project. One is a bedside table and the other is a stool. Both pieces are made of MDF wood. For the stool, I did upholstery using 3-inch thick foam. I was then asked to choose the fabric to cover the stool, which was stitched using a sewing machine. After that, the fabric was placed over the foam, sprayed with foam spray, cut to shape, stitched, and finally placed on top of the foam.













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### Taara Vinna

The project focuses on creating a luxurious wooden tableware collection that combines traditional Indian craftsmanship with modern design. The aim is to produce ecofriendly, visually appealing tableware using Sheesham wood and the Taarkashi inlay technique.

















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### Delving into the Intricacies

Designed a furniture collection for Mr. and Mrs. Jain's Chandigarh residence, blending Indian contemporary flair with European classical accents. The interiors feature brick walls, arches, and straight lines, complemented by elegant wallpapers and warm wooden flooring. The collection is designed to integrate seamlessly with the existing décor, offering customization options for fabrics, finishes, and dimensions. It infuses cultural depth through artisanal techniques. A blend of traditional Indian charm and European refinement is evident in the furniture collection, reflecting timeless elegance and richness. Every item serves as both a functional and artistic statement that embodies the refined taste of the Jains. The goal is to create a carefully curated collection that reflects Chandigarh's vibrant and diverse culture while enhancing the residence's unique modern and traditional design.

# Fashion Clothing Design



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### Koshur And Bouin

The inspiration behind this project comes from the beauty of Kashmir, specifically Koshur and Bouin. The collection features Indo-western and casual wear for the women of J&K.

Koshur showcases the elegance of Kashmiri clothing culture, adorned with aari embroidery, where the delicate hues of spring are embodied with a modern touch.

Bouin–embracing resilience–the often-overlooked beauty of nature. The chinar leaf, a symbol of Kashmir's spirit, perseveres through harsh winters, transforming into a canvas of rich browns. I tried to capture this resilience with a unique tie-dye technique that reflects the crumpled leaf's texture and color palette.



















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### Alankaar

The 'Alankaar' collection is inspired by the quirkiness and vibrant motifs of truck art practiced in India. The trucks serve as huge canvases showcasing a unique Indian identity in all its pride and splendor. The collection depicts the boldness and pride in desi culture that a person holds. Drawing inspiration from the colors and embellishments of truck art, the collection captures the colorful and embellished journey of the trucks.

The 'Rainforest of the Sea' collection is inspired by the softness, pastel colors, and elements of coral reefs. 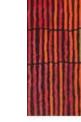

Drawing from global circular design practices, I proposed strategies to filter, recover, and rethink the carpet product cycle. In the practical phase, I upcycled discarded carpet fibers through filtering and cleaning, repurposing them into interior accessories like room partitions and dividers. The project demonstrated how waste can be transformed into functional, valuable products while advocating for a more circular, sustainable carpet industry in India.

The Jharokha is a stone window projecting from the wall face of a building, typically in an upper story, overlooking a street, market, court, or any other space. It is a common feature in classical Indian architecture, most prominent in Rajasthan. The collection takes inspiration from Indian Islamic architecture, especially the beauty and intricate curves of the Jharokhas found across the country, amalgamated with chikankari craft to further enhance the beauty of this fine craft. The idea behind working on this particular theme was to introduce motifs that are fresh but still hold the feel and essence of chikankari craft, which could be infused into the stitches and blend well.

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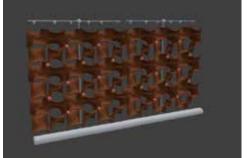
#### Gyroi: The Future Of Sustainable Cooling

Gyroi Tiles are a sustainable cooling system made of terracotta, based on natural evaporative cooling via their permeable surface. Drawing inspiration from the gyroid minimal surface—a geometry present inside the wings of butterflies—the tiles have an immense surface area to maximize cooling performance. As modular, stackable forms, they are light, easy to move around, and simple to install in various ways according to different space requirements. Their intrinsic gyroid form offers stability and strength with flexible configurations to optimize evaporation and airflow. When installed, Gyroi Tiles are capable of forming cooler areas in public places like bus stops, railway stations, and parks to provide respite during scorching summers. Through nature-inspired design, Gyroi Tiles introduce a new, flexible, low-energy thermal comfort solution for community spaces.

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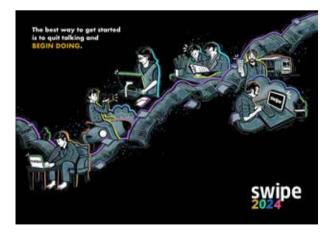

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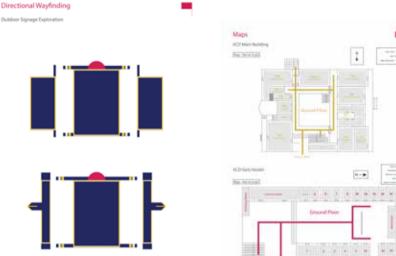
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#### Signage And Wayfinding System For IICD

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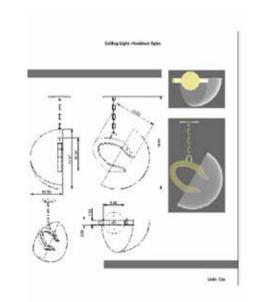
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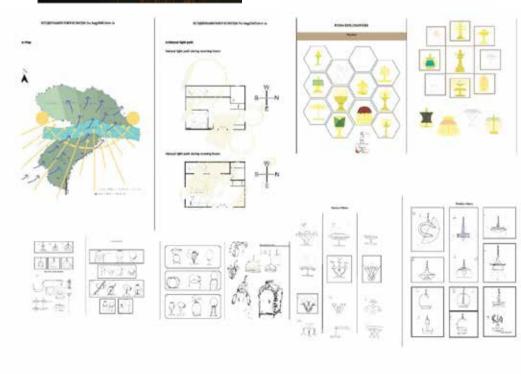

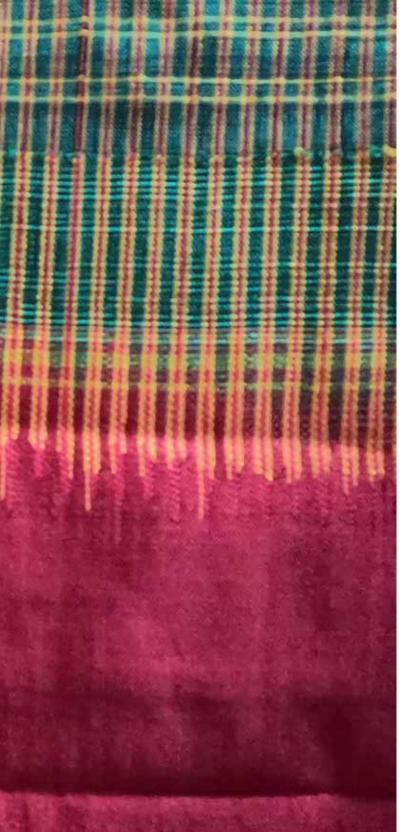

In collaboration with Rajit Rozi Shiksha Kendra, the project repurposes textile waste while reviving the traditional embroidery techniques of Kantha and Sujani Collection One is a homelinen range featuring table mats, runners, cushion covers, curtains, coasters, and table covers. Collection Two reimagines 1970s silhouettes into a line of tote bags, cross-body bags, hobo bags, and satchels. Developed using dissolvable-sheet stitching techniques and co-design workshops with artisans, this collection emphasizes both innovation and collaboration. Second Stitch presents a replicable, zero-waste, artisan-led design model that both safeguards cultural heritage and responds to contemporary environmental demands with global relevance.

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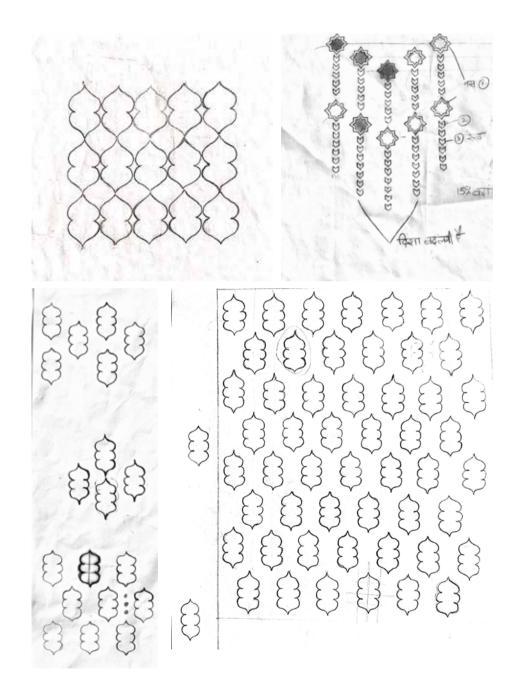

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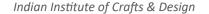
## Burn The Town

Reviving discarded, moisture-damaged woodblocks from Sanganer, the collection embraces distortion and imperfection as acts of rebellion. These blocks produce abstract prints that symbolize disrupted identities and fractured systems. As part of the textile and concept design team, I worked with screen prints, acid washes, dry brush textures, and layered graphics to express visual chaos and inner fire. Burn The Town is not just fashion—it's a form of reclaiming space, a visual uprising, and a step in Dripgod's powerful comeback as a voice for today's rebellious generation.

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## In Dialogue, Shapes & Colours

Inspired by the iconic Bauhaus movement, this collection explores bold geometric forms through hand block printing. It began with a series of stoles featuring circles, lines, and rectangles arranged to create striking compositions. The design language then transitions into cushion covers, where the same geometric elements are reimagined in a dramatic black and deep red palette. These cushions bring bold, graphic statements into interior spaces, blending traditional craft with modernist sensibilities. The project highlights the seamless connection between Indian block printing and contemporary design, showing how a unified visual concept can evolve from textiles worn on the body to décor pieces that transform homes. It celebrates versatility, craft, and the timeless power of shape and color.





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## Ocean And Friends

### **Project Description:**

This graduation project explores the creation of a playful and educational textile collection titled "Ocean and Friends", inspired by marine life. It includes a series of soft toys and play mats designed for children aged 0-6 years, promoting imaginative play and early learning. The products are crafted using safe, child-friendly materials and feature colorful embroidery and patchwork techniques. Through interactive design and storytelling elements, the collection aims to foster curiosity about the ocean while supporting sensory development and motor skills in young children.

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## **Autumnal And Mirasa Collection**

This graduation project features two home furnishing collections that merge traditional craftsmanship with modern design. Autumnal presents 15 crochet-based cushion covers inspired by the seasonal transitions of autumn, using layered yarns and fabric manipulation to evoke falling leaves and textured landscapes. Mirasa includes table runners, placemats, coasters, and napkins influenced by traditional Kutch embroidery. These motifs are abstracted and simplified to suit contemporary, minimalist interiors. Both collections emphasize cultural storytelling and handcrafted techniques—Autumnal reflecting nature's rhythms, while Mirasa reimagines Indian embroidery for modern homes, together forming a cohesive narrative of tradition, texture, and abstract expression.

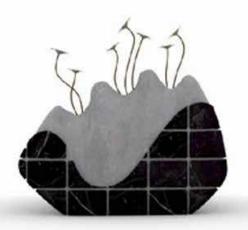

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## Sustainable, Insulating Bricks

This project explores sustainable, insulating bricks for non-load-bearing interior walls in cold regions like Ooty. Made from mycelium and vegetable waste powders (potato, broccoli, radish, etc.), the bricks use natural binders to create a low-cost, biodegradable alternative to conventional insulation. The material composition improves thermal performance while utilizing local agricultural waste. Mycelium acts as a natural binder, and the vegetable fibers add structure and texture. Various combinations were tested to enhance strength, moisture resistance, and ease of production. The project also considers interlocking forms for modular use in eco-friendly rural housing.











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## **Quartz Craft**

Quartz Craft redefines surface design by repurposing quartz slab waste into sustainable, functional, and decorative surfaces. Inspired by Indian royal heritage and fused with contemporary aesthetics, the project explores quartz's physical properties, processing techniques, and design potential. Experimentation with inlay work, curved cutting, and material fusion created unique surfaces and countertops blending tradition with modern use.

Hands-on learning with Rhino, AutoCAD, ArtCAM, and CNC machines enabled precise shaping and milling while addressing challenges in material handling and joining. Each outcome reflects a balance of heritage and innovation, contributing to responsible design in surface and furniture industries.













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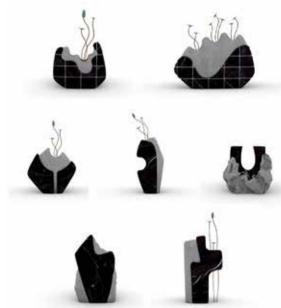
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## Kosh

Kosh is a collection of sculptural furniture and tabletop objects that blurs the line between art and function. Rooted in an intuitive, material-led approach, the project explores the emotional weight of form through marble and wood. What began as a search for structure evolved into a deeper conversation with materials, allowing their resistance, grain, and imperfections to guide the process. Each piece, though utilitarian, holds a contemplative presence: a bench that feels like a grounded sculpture, or vases that echo with quiet tension beneath their polished surfaces. Created under the brand Art Attaichi–founded by Fainy Thakor to carry stories through soulful objects—the work aims to spark lasting curiosity. It invites touch, reflection, and dialogue while honouring craft traditions in a contemporary voice.











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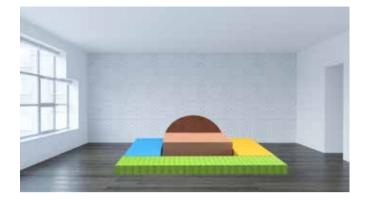
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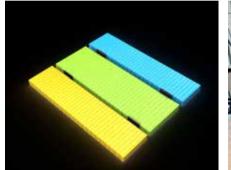
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## **Tot Bumper**

During my exchange programme at L'École de Design Nantes Atlantique in the field of Industrial Design, I had the opportunity to immerse myself in a rich, multidisciplinary environment that fostered creativity, critical thinking, and hands-on learning. This experience allowed me to explore new design methodologies, cultural perspectives, and collaborative practices while pushing the boundaries of my design approach. Engaging with international peers and participating in studio projects, workshops, and real-world design challenges broadened my understanding of sustainability, user-centered design, and innovation. This documentation captures my academic journey, creative process, and key learnings that have significantly contributed to my personal and professional growth as a designer.











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## Reified

This graduation project explores the emotional potential of functional objects through three collections in the barware and hospitality space. It examines how stories, textures, and rituals influence our relationship with everyday tools, transforming them into expressions of memory, identity, and mood. SUITS is a barware collection inspired by card games and the tension of revealing one's hand, expressed through hidden suit symbols. ON THE ROCKS is a liquor gifting range that blends the rugged textures of stone, ice, and whisky with refined, brutalist forms. KUROHANA draws from Japanese dining and the idea of "lethal beauty," where elegance carries an edge of danger. Together, these collections explore contrasts-light and dark, smooth and sharp, familiar and unexpected-merging research, material play, and personal voice into tangible outcomes.











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## Hues

This document presents the outcomes of a 17-week Graduation Project undertaken as part of the IICD curriculum, in collaboration with Dastkari, Hyderabad—a design studio known for crafting unique, detailed furniture pieces. This project explores how colours can inspire furniture design in a way that goes beyond just looks. The collections—like Rise, Breathe & Float—show how different colours bring different energies, from the bold passion of red to the calm peace of green and the gentle flow of blue. Each piece tells a story about how colour can shape our experience in a space. Each collection required a meticulous exploration of form, guided by unique briefs and artistic directions. The outcome reflects the ability to adapt to a studio's refined visual language through practice-based learning.

















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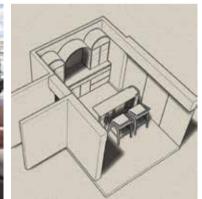
## Indo - Noir

The brief for the first collection outlines the design requirements for a seed bead jewelry collection that seamlessly merges contemporary 2025 trends with the rich tradition of seed bead craftsmanship. The second one outlines the design requirements for a 'back to school' themed jewelry collection aimed at capturing the excitement and spirit of returning to school after a break, while the third collection outlines the theme of Halloween. All of these collections should appeal to a youthful audience as well as those who appreciate nostalgic designs.











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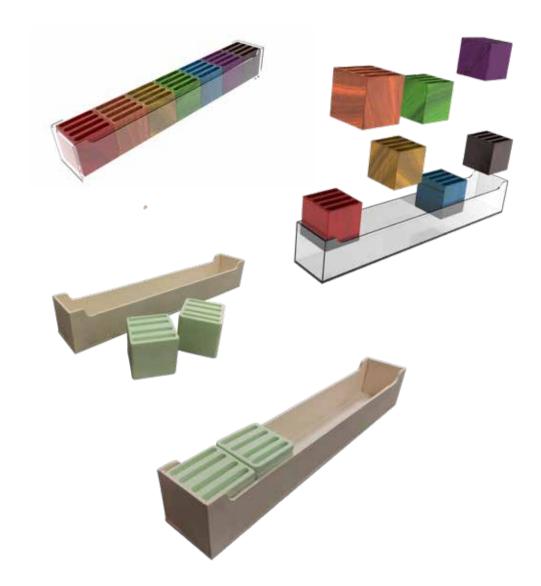
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## Threads of Connection : Designing for Parent - Child Bonding

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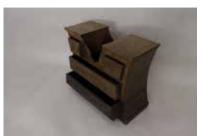
## Vairagya

Vairagya is a design project that gives new meaning to abandoned furniture, inspired by a 2015 fire at Chirmi Overseas. Instead of restoring damaged pieces, it transforms them while preserving their scars and history. The collection is divided into two themes—Detachment and Attachment—representing loss and connection. Each piece goes through a process of cleaning, repairing, and reshaping, where imperfections are embraced rather than hidden. Blending raw textures with skilled craftsmanship, Vairagya creates a unique aesthetic. It reflects the beauty of change, the value of imperfection, and the idea that transformation is a powerful part of creation.













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## Sustainable Footwear

My graduation project, Sustainable Footwear, explores how modular design can contribute to reducing footwear consumption and supporting a circular economy. The concept is to create a single pair of shoes that can be transformed into two to three different types of footwear, adapting to diverse needs and occasions while extending the product's life cycle. Footwear is one of the most consumed and discarded fashion items worldwide, generating massive waste due to short usage spans and non-recyclable materials. By integrating transformable components, replaceable parts, and thoughtful material choices, this project reimagines shoes as adaptable and long-lasting companions rather than disposable products. Ultimately, the aim is to provide users with versatile shoes that minimize environmental impact and promote mindful consumption.

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## Kitchen Gardening System

I wanted to create objects that would help bridge the disconnect between humans and their environment. This project aims to offer a complete experience: growing food from seeds to harvesting and consuming it, by means of a stackable terracotta planter unit designed to accommodate nine edible varieties of plants in a semi-indoor space, along with a washable harvest basket, a sprout maker, a grater/herb stripper, and a set of salad bowls, plates, and mixers. I chose to create specifically for edible varieties of plants so one can experience the full circle of giving and receiving from them tangibly. I hope this project is a step towards enabling people to make an effort for non-monetary gains, to make users more considerate towards our environment, and to contribute to it by doing our part to the best of our ability, as we're all born out of this earth and not into it.

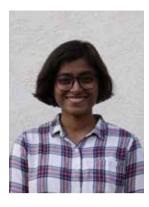

The lamp's unique blend of old and new creates a captivating ambiance, adding warmth and character to any space. Its modern twist on traditional design makes it a stunning conversation piece. "Shuzuku" is a ceramic sushi platter inspired by wabi-sabi, embracing imperfections and impermanence. Its rustic, handmade design features subtle irregularities, creating a unique and authentic presentation for sushi that celebrates the beauty of simplicity and natural imperfection.











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## Earth To Echoes

When I came across Maya Angelou's words, "People will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel," it all made sense to me. The power to craft an experience that means something—to touch hearts, spark thoughts, and maybe even shift perspectives; to be able to connect, inspire, and influence society, excites me the most. That's when the idea of an installation began to take shape.

This project is about creating an interactive installation that explores the relationship between the viewer and clay as a material. I envisioned creating an immersive sensory experience that invites viewers to engage with sound and form in a dynamic and meaningful way, reflecting the emotional and experiential qualities of music through the earthy touch of ceramics.



















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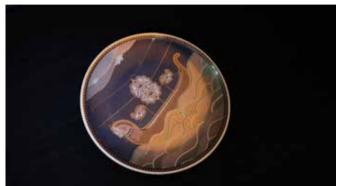
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## Fragments of Fire

This graduation project, in collaboration with Namrata Kedia Design (NKD), explored porcelain in two distinct forms—tableware and jewellery. The first collection focused on luxury tableware inspired by Nauka Vihar scenes from Rajasthani miniature paintings, using hand-illustrated gold decals to create a narrative-driven dessertware range. The second collection shifted to wearable art, translating delicate floral forms into handcrafted porcelain jewellery with gold-plated brass detailing. Both collections were rooted in material exploration, glaze and surface experimentation, and a deep engagement with NKD's visual language. The project also contributed to the studio's development of clay and glaze bodies for future in-house porcelain production.

Rooted in traditions like Kantha and Kheta, yet speaking to a contemporary, global context, Becoming reflects how clothing can evolve just as we do-quietly, continuously. It challenges fast fashion by embracing slow processes, intuitive making, and cultural continuity. Designed as a graduation project, it invites every young maker to ask: What stories can fabric hold, and how can we wear them forward?

The rhythmic tana-bana of Maheshwari looms hum softly as I open a carton of shimmering fabrics, jewels from a forgotten past. Like opening an old sandook, it reveals not just cloth but stories, memories, and a legacy woven into every thread. If Maheshwar were a sandook, it would hold the soul of its weavers, the whispers of its ghats, and the grace of its heritage.

This collection stands as the Rehwa Society's first garment line, crafted with intention and reverence. Alongside celebrating these treasured fabrics, the project quietly set in motion a living rhythm, a sustainable practice that nurtures the ongoing transformation of surplus into new design stories, beyond the presence of any single hand.

Blending Rehwa's natural textiles with WomenWeave's khadi, the collection weaves a future rooted in heritage and mindful renewal. From Maheshwar's sandook to yours.

This collection reimagines waste fabrics from Dharan into striking, wearable art. Crafted entirely from discarded textiles, each garment is a testament to sustainable design and traditional Indian craftsmanship. Designed as free-size with relaxed, fluid silhouettes, the collection embraces size inclusivity, ensuring comfort and elegance for every body type. What truly defines this initiative is its all women team, hands behind every stitch, fostering empowerment, ethical fashion, and financial independence. More than garments, these creations are stories of transformation: from textile waste to timeless expressions of artistry. 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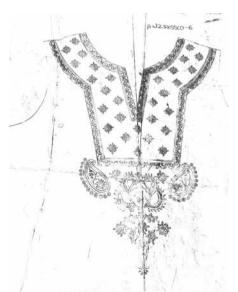

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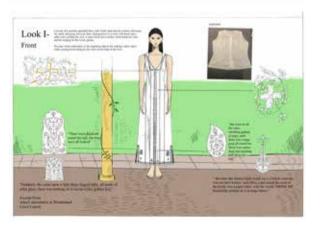
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## What Alice Found There?

It is my interpretation of the story drawn using the beautiful Chikankari embroidery of my city, Lucknow.

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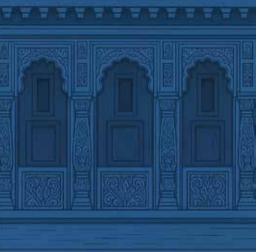
## Crafting Identity Through Packaging: Re-Branding And Packaging Design For Mukteshwar Bakery

By integrating local art with contemporary design, the project reimagines bakery packaging as a carrier of both nourishment and heritage—turning everyday products into storytelling vessels.















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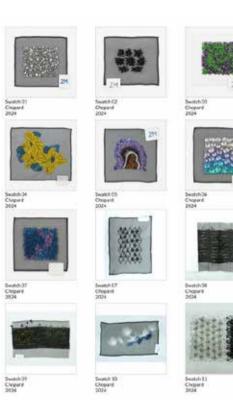
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## **Archives**

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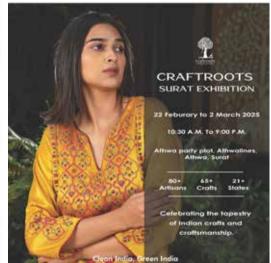
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## Handmade Presence: A Design Journey With Craftroots

My graduation project is a collaborative design initiative with Craftroots, a movement by Gramshree that celebrates India's rich craft heritage. The project explores the intersection of design and tradition through four key sub-projects: an exhibition in Surat, a packaging redesign for e-commerce, a curated display at Palladium Mall (Ahmedabad), and an End of Season Sale campaign. Each element highlights the essence of handmade crafts, aiming to create visually compelling and meaningful narratives that uplift artisans and engage diverse audiences. The project balances visual storytelling, cultural sensitivity, and strategic branding to strengthen Craftroots' identity across physical and digital platforms.













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## Thangka - A Tibetan Legacy

Exploring many Indian crafts at IICD, searching for the one that truly spoke to me, something I could give myself to completely. Then I found Thangka, a narrative art whose rhythm, patience, and spirit drew me in. It wasn't just art, it was a path. This film is a journey into the intimate lives of Norbu and Drolma, his wife, whose days are quietly woven with colour, silence, and devotion. Tsering Norbu is a Thangka artist who welcomed me into his world, his studio, and his story. Through him, I saw that Thangka isn't just a painting. It's a discipline and faith in motion. This project shows how art isn't something you make, it's something that makes you. A film exploring the life of a Thangka practitioner. My dual role as a filmmaker and researcher allowed me to move fluidly between observation and interaction, making space for moments of both spontaneity and intentional reflection.













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## licd X The India Story Adn France Exchange Programme Project

This graduation project explores two parallel journeys rooted in design, storytelling, and spatial innovation. The first is an academic collaboration between IICD Jaipur and The India Story (TIS), Kolkata, celebrating TIS's 10th edition. It documents key narratives from the event and culminates in a publication by IICD. The second part involves an exchange semester at L'École de design Nantes Atlantique, France, under Retail and Interior Design, where a long-term project focused on branding and the future of Konglan Boots was developed. Together, these experiences reflect a blend of Indian craft, retail storytelling, and global design approaches.













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## Behind The Sparkle

For my graduation project, I interned at Glad U Came, a leading PR and communication agency based in Mumbai. I worked across fashion, beauty, and lifestyle brands, managing digital strategy and content creation. My responsibilities included planning monthly Instagram calendars, designing static posts, carousels, and editing reels tailored to each brand's tone. I also coordinated with influencers, especially for Paytm's campaign during India Couture Week in Bangalore. Acting as a point of contact for some accounts, I ensured timely deliveries and maintained brand consistency. This hands-on experience sharpened my storytelling skills, taught me to work under tight deadlines, and helped me bridge design with real-world brand communication.













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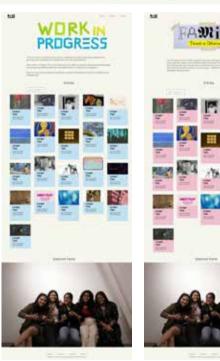
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## **Crafting Better Journeys**

This project was undertaken during a four-month internship at MAP. It focused on the design and development of Pulse, MAP's online youth journal. The project aimed to build an accessible, user-centered, and visually engaging digital platform that reflects MAP's commitment to inclusive storytelling. The process began with defining the site's information architecture through physical card-sorting exercises to effectively organize and categorize content. A custom design system was developed, including a curated color palette, typography, button styles, and consistent interface components such as headers and footers. High-fidelity wireframes were created, followed by the implementation of the site using Wix for its accessible features and flexibility. Collaboration played a key role, with hands-on training sessions conducted for the MAP team to ensure the site's long-term usability.

As part of my graduation project at The Creators Project, I worked on two independent branding-led assignments across architecture and luxury surface sectors. The first project, for InSpatia – a concept-driven spatial design studio, involved creating a minimal visual identity, an editorial-style catalogue, and a curated digital presence. The second project, for MCI's launch of Atlas Concorde in India, focused on developing a premium product catalogue and large-format event poster aligned with the brand's global identity system. Both projects required balancing strategic design thinking with refined visual storytelling across print and digital platforms.

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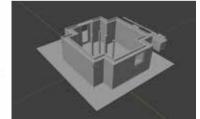
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## Yul Khim

## Soft Material Design



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## Desi Oon of Patanwadi Sheep and Varathe of Wild Onion

My project focuses on Desi Oon, local sheep wool from the Kutch region, mainly from the Patanwadi breed. I worked with Khamir to study the entire wool ecosystem, from sheep and shepherds to spinners, dyers, and weavers.

The focus has been given to an old and lesser-known technique of using wild onion paste as a natural sizing material on wool warp, something I felt was important to document, as well as the Patanwadi sheep breed and its wool. I collaborated with a weaver in Nagor village to create woven samples on a 16-meter warp using wild onion paste for sizing. We experimented with around 20 stripe patterns and two different drafting techniques. A palette of 20 shades was developed in natural dyes on wool to use in the weft. The project connects material research with traditional knowledge and design, showing how Desi Oon can be used meaningfully in contemporary textiles.

Through this project with Chhoti Si Asha, Chandigarh, I gained hands-on experience designing functional and sustainable product collections rooted in traditional crafts and cultural narratives. I developed two distinct collections: a cosmos-inspired stationery and essentials range using patchwork made from textile waste, and a cushion collection inspired by vibrant Phulkari embroidery.

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## Beyond The Thread

Beyond the Thread presents three contemporary craft-based collections—Whispers Beneath the Weave, Chinh, and Raahguzar - Between Doors and Shadows—crafted for a young, style-conscious audience aged 25-35. Whispers Beneath the Weave offers a fresh interpretation of the Tangaliya weave, merging intricate dana motifs with modern silhouettes. Chinh further explores Tangaliya through minimal kurta and dress materials, balancing traditional technique with understated elegance. Raahguzar blends resist and direct block printing, layering mud-resist textures with vibrant hand-blocked motifs on clean, wearable forms. Each collection reimagines heritage crafts for today's wardrobe, combining artisanal depth with contemporary appeal.









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## Designing The Conscious Home - A Textural Journey For The Wall And Living Room Area

This graduation project focuses on sustainable design through two handcrafted collections made from textile waste. The first features wall art created with wool, fabric scraps, sequins, beads, and embroidery, offering a tactile and artistic appeal. The second includes functional living room accessories—table mats, cushion covers, runners, and organisers—crafted using knitting and crochet techniques with waste from the saree industry.

Inspired by field visits to Kanpur, where artisans skillfully knit with discarded fabric, the project aims to create products that are marketable, replicable, and beneficial for both makers and consumers. By blending contemporary design with traditional craftsmanship, it addresses textile waste, promotes eco-conscious lifestyles, and supports artisan livelihoods.

















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## Kaleidoscope of Life

My collection is a mix of hand block printed sarees and journaling products, inspired by the concept "Kaleidoscope of Life." Just like a kaleidoscope shows many patterns and colors coming together to form something beautiful, life also has many moments—happy, sad, calm, and exciting. I tried to bring this feeling into my designs. For this collection, I used pigment-based block printing on Chanderi silk and cotton 60x60 fabrics, as well as cartridge, watercolor, and newsprint sheets. The colors are chosen from the Spring-Summer 2026 trend forecast, featuring soft, fresh, and earthy tones. I wanted my work to feel both modern and rooted in tradition. The sarees are light and breathable—perfect for summer. The journaling products are designed to support creativity and self-expression. This collection is for people who value art, sustainability, and storytelling in the things they use and wear.

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## Bloom & Flow

Bloom and Flow brings together two rich design narratives that reflect both the innocence and depth of the natural world. The first inspiration arises from a garden stroll seen through the eyes of a five-year-old child, where the vibrant colors of flowers, the lush greenery of leaves, and the sweetness of fresh air symbolize playfulness and the blossoming stage of life. This part of the collection features soft fabrics, delicate hand embroidery, and simple yet charming silhouettes that capture the joy and innocence of childhood.

The second inspiration is drawn from the rhythm, flow, and transformation of rivers. Nui Shibori, a traditional stitch-resist dyeing technique, depicts the waves and surface movement of water. Complementing this, Kheta embroidery—a traditional craft from the Kishanganj region of Bihar—embellishes the garments with fine running stitches.











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## Woven Whispers And Threaded Thoughts

For my graduation project, I had the opportunity to collaborate with Okhai, where I developed two distinct collections. The first was inspired by traditional Ikat weaves, celebrating the rich heritage and craftsmanship behind this unique textile. The second collection focused on hot-selling colors, aligning with current market trends to ensure commercial appeal. Both collections featured innovative silhouettes not typically seen in Okhai's existing offerings, allowing me to introduce fresh design perspectives to the brand.

Additionally, I incorporated detailed garment construction techniques to enhance the overall structure and finish of each piece. By blending traditional textiles with contemporary silhouettes and thoughtful craftsmanship, my project aimed to offer Okhai a unique balance between heritage and modern design.

















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## The Summer of Two Tales

During my final semester at IICD Jaipur, I partnered with Delhi-based label Aekatri to create two cohesive, summer-ready collections—one for women and one for kids—that reflect the brand's ethos of sustainable, minimal elegance infused with traditional Indian craftsmanship. I led every stage of the process, beginning with mood and inspiration boards. I selected pastel cotton-silk and cambric fabrics and experimented with motifs, hand and machine embroidery, smocking, pleats, frills, appliqué, and khaka stencils. From over 40 silhouette ideas, I refined five unique designs for each line, developing technical sketches, precise embroidery placement, samples, finishing, and detailed costing sheets. The result is a range of airy garments that harmonize comfort with artisanal detail—demonstrating my ability to transform academic design research into thoughtful, commercially viable fashion pieces.



















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## Prakruti

Prakruti is an organic khadi wear collection that celebrates the harmony between nature, sustainability, and mindful living. Inspired by the tranquility and beauty of forests, this collection features handcrafted, eco-friendly garments made from 100% organic khadi fabric. Rooted in tradition yet designed for modern living, each piece offers comfort, breathability, and freedom of movement—ideal for yoga, meditation, or everyday wear.

With a color palette drawn from the earthy tones of nature, Vana Vida brings together the elegance of simplicity and the power of sustainability. It's more than clothing; it's a mindful, eco-conscious lifestyle that connects the wearer to the earth and their own sense of balance.

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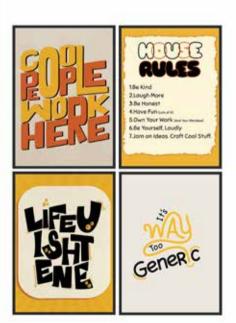

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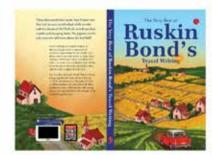
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#### Chitran

Our work involved developing a comprehensive, context-appropriate data collection and archiving framework, as well as drafting Catalogue Vol. 1 for the museum. We analyzed existing practices in India, advocating for ethical stewardship and community-centric approaches. This system lays the groundwork for the MEDHA Museum to become a model for cultural preservation, significantly contributing to both heritage safeguarding and the socio-economic empowerment of local craft communities.

## Soft Material Design



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#### Cadence In Paper

The project cadence in paper explores the emotional and sustainable potential of handmade paper through two collections – Miniature Moments and Neo Grid. Crafted from banana and cotton fibre paper, the project merges storytelling, visual rhythm, and eco-conscious design.

Miniature Moments: A collection of tiny envelope hampers and paper scenes that celebrate intimacy, proportion play, and tactile interaction using kirigami and layering techniques.

Neo Grid: Inspired by Piet Mondrian's grid-based art, this collection features modular paper sets, wrapping sheets, and packaging designed with clean lines and a softened primary palette. Together, both collections highlight how paper can become a medium for mindful creativity and emotional expression.











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#### Prayana

The project Prayana tries to develop two materials: one from waste fabric (organic and synthetic mix) and one from screwpine (grass), and aims to show the possibility of product development from both materials.











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#### Bhunga: The Inner Charm Of Kutch

"My project has worked with hand block printing in the craft-based village of Bagru. Therefore, the project's collection is inspired by Bhunga (mud houses in Kutch) – specifically, the interior art known as Lippan Kaam. The project is a blend of art and tradition (mud relief work + hand block printing), resulting in the development of motifs, blocks, and products for the high-end market."

#### Kaithari: Crafting With Threads of Tradition and Ayurvedic Colour

"The project required designing and developing a collection of handwoven garments using traditional handwoven cotton fabrics of Kerala. The overall design approach focuses on reflecting simplicity and subtlety."













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#### Dwijah-Born Again

"Dwijah - Born Again" is a graduation project that focuses on sustainability and creative reuse. The word Dwijah means "born again" in Sanskrit, and it reflects the main idea of this project: giving new life to old or leftover fabric pieces through design. The project is divided into two collections. Collection One focuses on the creation of textiles using patchwork techniques, where fabric waste and scraps are thoughtfully stitched together to form new surfaces. Collection Two involves the design and creation of bags using scrap fabrics, brought to life through the patchwork technique. The inspiration was drawn from already existing blocks and the lotus flower, which were reimagined and rearranged to form new compositions. This project is a small step towards sustainable design and shows how fabric waste can be turned into something meaningful and beautiful through creativity and care.

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#### Dharohar: An Exploration of Vernacular Furniture Forms in Rajasthan

Dharoharis my graduation project focused on reviving Rajasthanivernacular furniture and highlighting its cultural value. In today's modern world, many people don't even know the names or purposes of these traditional pieces, which once played a vital role in local life. My roots are in a village near Jaipur, where I had early exposure to such furniture, sparking my interest to learn more. Through this project, I researched their design and materials, aiming to document and reinterpret them for contemporary use. The goal was not just to preserve this forgotten art, but to present it to a wider audience and reconnect people with their cultural roots. Dharohar is a tribute to traditional knowledge, sustainable practices, and local artisanship. It reflects my journey of rediscovery and my effort to bring awareness to a heritage that deserves recognition and revival in modern design.













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#### Lac And Grain

The collections feature handcrafted wooden products finished with vibrant lacquer. The first collection is a puzzle series for children aged 3 and above, featuring animal pairs of a mother and her young, crafted in identical shapes of different sizes. Select parts are removable and reattachable using magnetic joinery, encouraging hands-on play that builds spatial awareness, logic, and motor skills.

The second collection is a living room décor line inspired by the Kathakali depiction of Lord Krishna, expressed through bold colours and designs that reflect Krishna's joyful, heroic, and compassionate spirit. The collection combines traditional themes with vibrant forms to bring warmth, character, and cultural richness into modern living spaces.



















## Fired Material Design



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#### Fired And Forged

The first project aims to enhance traditional glass cane and bead-making in Purdilnagar (U.P.) through collaborative R&D. Using wood-fired furnaces and glass chunks to create multi-layered cane, the craft faces challenges due to inconsistent raw materials from the Firozabad glass industry, which cause variations in thermal expansion and viscosity. This project utilizes glass, indigenous techniques, and local craftsmanship to standardize material properties—enabling the production of high-quality cane suitable for both furnace and kiln processes, and broadening its potential for artistic applications. The second project involved designing a tulip-inspired chandelier that integrates metal and glass through iterative prototyping. Challenges related to scale, weight, and joint detailing were addressed collaboratively with artisans in Firozabad and Moradabad. The result is a sculptural lighting piece that merges digital design with traditional fabrication techniques.

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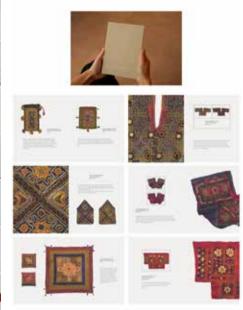
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#### Medha- Museum Archival & Data Collection

This project focused on developing a textile archiving and documentation system for the MEDHA Museum in Jaisalmer, directly supporting the museum's mission to preserve Jaisalmer's textile legacy. Our work involved creating a sustainable and ethical system that bridges traditional practices with digital archiving. We conducted extensive research, drawing insights from leading cultural institutions and documentation standards.

A key outcome was the creation of the initial Catalogue Draft Vol. 1 for the upcoming museum. This comprehensive system ensures the museum's collection is meticulously documented—safeguarding invaluable textile heritage while also promoting the socioeconomic well-being of Jaisalmer's craftspeople.
