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IICD Crafts Business Accelerator Program 2025

IICD continues to deepen its impact with a crafts business accelerator program fostering innovation, sustainability, and entrepreneurship in the craft sector across diverse regional contexts. This 2025 edition marks yet another leap forward, seeding enterprising talent, strengthening market readiness, and reinforcing the critical importance of business ecosystems tailored uniquely for Indian crafts.

The Indian Institute of Crafts & Design (IICD), in collaboration with IIM Udaipur Incubation Center, PIEDS, BITS Pilani, EDII Ahmedabad, iStart (Govt. of Rajasthan), NICEorg, NEHHDC Guwahati, and supported by the Kalhath Foundation, Lucknow, culminated its fourth edition of the Crafts Business Accelerator Program. This four-month initiative bringing together twelve early-stage craft entrepreneurs delivered immersive workshops, field visits, mentoring, and peer learning, all uniquely structured to scale craft-based businesses and foster long-term entrepreneurial resilience.

Three Tailored Modules – Learning + Field Immersion

Module 1 | 21–26 April | IICD, Jaipur

Participants kicked off their journey focusing on design thinking, sustainability, and innovation. Sessions on digital marketing, product photography, storytelling, and costing & positioning laid a solid foundation. Visits to Sanganer, Kanota Courtyard, and Tapri Ladu Store provided unique opportunity to enter process to connect theoretical framework with real-world craft environments.

Module 2 | 25–31 May | IIM Udaipur

Second Module emphasized on legal compliances, financial modelling, and go-to-market strategies. Deep dives into distribution challenges, customer journeys, creative supply chains, co-creation, and business storytelling enriched entrepreneurial thinking. Field explorations included Tapri Niwas, Aavaran, and Mangalam Arts, highlighting compelling

craft-business models in action.

The second module of the Crafts Business Accelerator Program at IIM Udaipur provided participants with valuable exposure to a premier management and incubation ecosystem. The setting enabled meaningful engagement with experts on legal, financial, marketing, and scaling strategies, while field visits enriched learning through real-world craft and retail contexts. Hosting the module at IIM Udaipur strengthened industry-academia linkages and equipped craft entrepreneurs with practical tools to build sustainable, market-ready enterprises.

Module 3 | 30 June–5 July | New Delhi

The final and concluding module equipped participants with advanced skills in negotiation, AI applications in craft, sustainable packaging, branding, and crafting a strong pitch deck. Field visits to the Crafts Museum and the Atma Nirbhar Bharat Centre for Design rounded off the curriculum, inspiring participants to incorporate culture, technology, and design into their enterprise strategies.

Throughout the program, participants received individual mentorship and handholding support tailored to their specific business needs.

The program concluded with a vibrant valedictory session featuring a curated showcase attended by industry experts, faculty, mentors, and alumni. On May 31, 2025, a handcrafted clay pottery piece symbolizing the fusion of traditional craftsmanship and contemporary design was presented to Hon'ble Prime Minister Shree Narendra Modi.

This exquisite artifact was the result of a collaboration between renowned potter Shankar Prajapati and Indian Institute of Crafts & Design alumna Ms. Shailly Sangal. Their work celebrated the beauty of India's rich clay traditions while embodying IICD's philosophy of preserving heritage through modern design sensibilities.

Designed by Shailly and skillfully crafted by Shankar, the piece stands as a testament to co-creation where age-old techniques meet innovative ideas. Its earthy texture, elegant contours, and intricate storytelling motifs convey a deeper narrative of India's soil, spirit, and design evolution.

The honour of presenting this pottery to the Prime Minister highlights the significance of design interventions in bringing traditional crafts to national prominence. It also emphasizes the vital partnership between trained designers and traditional artisans, an approach that IICD actively promotes to sustain and innovate India's craft heritage.

MoU with 200 Million Artisans to Co-Create Kula Conclave 2025 at Jaipur

An MoU was signed on 9th April between Dr. Toolika Gupta, Director, IICD and Ms. Priya Krishnamoorthy, Founder of 200 Million Artisans, establishing a strategic collaboration between the Indian Institute of Crafts and Design (IICD), Jaipur, and 200 Million Artisans (200M) to co-create the Kula Conclave for India's Creative Manufacturing and Handmade sector.

Scheduled for 1st and 2nd December in Jaipur, the Kula Conclave 2025 will bring together craft-led enterprises, social businesses, policy leaders, and investors. The forum is envisioned as a platform for dialogue, collaboration, and ecosystem-level impact.

As Knowledge Partner, IICD will play a key role in shaping the conclave through curated exhibitions, strategic workshops, and student-led engagements, fostering cultural entrepreneurship and inclusive growth.

IICD and NICEorg Forge Strategic Partnership to Empower Creative Enterprises



A strategic partnership to empower craft-based entrepreneurship and bridge design with business innovation

On April 24, 2025, the Indian Institute of Crafts and Design (IICD) and the Network of Indian Cultural Enterprises (NICEorg) signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to promote India's cultural and creative economy. This partnership aims to empower emerging craft-based entrepreneurs through knowledge exchange and capacity building.

The MoU focuses on building sustainable creative enterprises by leveraging NICEorg's national network of mentors, entrepreneurs, and investors. Through joint workshops and mentoring programs, the collaboration will bridge traditional craft knowledge with modern entrepreneurial skills.

Dr. Toolika Gupta, Director, IICD, highlighted that the partnership will help students transition "from designers to designpreneurs." Anchal Jain, co-chair of NICEorg, expressed enthusiasm about supporting young creators in building culturally rooted businesses.

Documenting Craft Heritage: A Collaborative Initiative by IICD and Crafts Council of Telangana

The Indian Institute of Crafts and Design (IICD), Jaipur, under the visionary leadership of its Director, Dr. Toolika Gupta, has entered into a meaningful collaboration with the Crafts Council of Telangana to document the traditional crafts of Telangana. This partnership reflects a shared commitment to preserving India's rich craft heritage through research, field engagement, and academic documentation.

The project aims to create a holistic record of Telangana's craft traditions by exploring their historical evolution, contemporary practices, production processes, and the socio-economic realities of artisan communities.

As part of the pilot phase, a focused research and documentation exercise was conducted in Warangal from 22nd June to 4th July. The intensive field study was carried out by IICD students under the guidance of Dr. Bessie Cecil and Mr. Pronoy Kapoor. The team engaged closely with local artisans, documenting crafts including durrie weaving, handloom textiles, metal embossing, bobbin lace, tatting and embroidery, leather craft, and wood carving—each reflecting generations of knowledge, skill, and regional identity.

Throughout the fieldwork, students demonstrated commitment, sensitivity, and empathy while interacting with craftspeople. They documented techniques, tools, materials, and motifs, while also recording oral histories, narratives,

and lived experiences. These interactions provided insights into challenges faced by craft communities today, including livelihood sustainability, market access, and intergenerational knowledge transfer.





This initiative will culminate in a comprehensive publication systematically documenting Telangana's traditional crafts. It is envisioned as a lasting academic and cultural resource for scholars, designers, policymakers, and practitioners, contributing to craft preservation, cultural sustainability, and artisan empowerment.

TCRC Lecture Series: Tracing The Birth of the Sherwani

On 3rd May 2025, the Indian Institute of Crafts and Design (IICD) hosted a TCRC (Textile and Costume Research Centre) lecture by Dr. Toolika Gupta, Director, IICD, titled "The Birth of the Sherwani." The session brought together academicians, designers, researchers, and students to examine the historical, cultural, and political contexts that shaped one of India's most iconic garments.

Dr. Gupta traced the sherwani's evolution from its 19th-century origins, influenced by Persian attire and British tailoring, to its adoption as a marker of Indian identity, status, and modernity. Through visual references and historical narratives, the lecture highlighted how costume reflects social change and cultural exchange. The session strongly aligned with TCRC's mission of encouraging critical research and dialogue in textile history, costume studies, and design culture.

Empowering SHGs through Sustainability

In a dedicated session, Ms Rashmi Pareek, Chief Manager (Project & Incubation) addressed the gathering on the occasion of a one-day workshop on World Earth Day, April 22, 2025, at the Indira Gandhi Panchayati Raj & Gramin Vikas Sansthan Auditorium, Jaipur organized by the Directorate of Local Bodies, Government of Rajasthan. The event brought together Self Help Group (SHG) members from across Rajasthan under the banner of Swachh Bharat Mission 2.0, with a focus on environment protection and sustainable practices.

She emphasized the importance of waste recycling as a catalyst for innovation and livelihood generation. The address highlighted how discarded materials, when creatively repurposed, can yield handcrafted products that reflect both environmental consciousness and economic potential. The workshop underscored a shared vision of building resilient communities through informed design, sustainability, and collective action.

Crafts, Camera, Culture 2025: A Cross-Cultural Filmmaking Journey



Crafts, Camera, Culture 2025 Craft Documentaries Film Screening on 2nd July 2025 at Rajasthan International Center, Jaipur

On 2nd July 2025, the five-week documentary film making programme held in June 2025 concluded with an inspiring and artfully curated screening at RIC; Rajasthan International Centre, Jaipur. Hosted by the Indian Institute of Crafts & Design (IICD) in collaboration with Michigan State University (MSU) and West Dean College, UK, the third edition of Crafts, Camera, Culture once again celebrated creativity, collaboration, and the living heritage of Indian crafts.

Designed as an immersive, field-based learning experience, the programme brought together students from diverse cultural and academic backgrounds. Over the course of five intensive weeks, participants explored the intricate craft ecosystems of Jaipur steeped in histories of material culture, storytelling, and artisanal knowledge. Through guided research, field interviews, hands-on documentation, and film production mentorship, the student teams crafted compelling short documentaries that illuminated lesser-known aspects of India's craft traditions. The culminating showcase at RIC

featured five short films, each offering a distinct visual and narrative interpretation of a craft story. Rooted in observation and empathy, the films presented human-centered stories that highlighted the resilience, humour, labour, and lived realities of artisans.

Kahani Dhaagon Ki explored the world of traditional puppeteers, revealing how craftsmanship, performance, and oral storytelling come together to preserve a centuries-old art form. Through intimate interviews and behind-the-scenes footage, the film captured the joys and challenges of sustaining puppetry in a rapidly modernizing world.

The Roar, a favourite among audiences, turned its lens towards the cultural legacy of the Royal Enfield motorcycle—an icon woven into the texture of contemporary India. The film explored not only the machine's craftsmanship but also the emotional and cultural symbolism that has made it a generational heritage object.

In Achaar Vichar, students travelled into kitchens and community spaces to document the art of pickle making. From ancient recipes to regional variations and the sensory richness of spices, the film highlighted how food, memory, and identity come together in this cherished domestic tradition.

The Nature of Things offered a quiet, contemplative study of handmade paper, capturing the tactile beauty of the material and the sustainable practices embedded in its making. The documentary foregrounded craftsmanship as an ecological act, prompting viewers to reflect on the relationship between industry, environment, and handmade knowledge.

Finally, An Indian Touch took a playful turn by following the "desi" evolution of momos, now a street-food favorite with local twists across India. The film celebrated culinary adaptation, showing how cultural exchange naturally shapes food habits and urban identities.

The event opened with a traditional lamp-lighting ceremony led by Chief Guest Dr. Pragya Paliwal Gaur, Director General of Akashvani News. In her address, she commended the program for utilizing film as a medium of cultural preservation and contemporary communication. She highlighted how storytelling through visual media offers new pathways to bring the voices of artisans to global audiences and ensures that heritage practices continue to find relevance among younger generations.



Adding depth to the evening was an artisan exhibition arranged alongside the screenings. Featuring craftspeople who had participated in the student research process, the exhibition beautifully reinforced the collaborative ethos of the programme. Visitors had the rare opportunity to engage

directly with artisans, view demonstrations, and explore the tangible materials and tools that appeared in the films. The presence of the makers enriched the experience, bridging the gap between cinematic storytelling and real-world craft practices. Faculty members and mentors from IICD, MSU, and West Dean College expressed pride in the students' achievements, particularly in the sensitivity with which they approached fieldwork. The programme encouraged students to step beyond the role of filmmakers and assume the posture of learners—listening, interpreting, and respecting the nuances of craft communities. This pedagogical shift is at the heart of Crafts, Camera, Culture, positioning film not merely as a technical skill but as a medium of inquiry, empathy, and cross-cultural understanding.

As the third edition comes to a close, Crafts, Camera, Culture continues to establish itself as a transformative platform for experiential learning. By bringing together institutions from India, the United States, and the United Kingdom, it fosters a rare international dialogue around craft traditions, sustainability, and creative authorship. For students, the program becomes a formative journey—one that shapes their perspectives as designers, thinkers, and storytellers.

The 2025 showcase affirmed what the programme stands for: the power of film to illuminate hidden narratives, the importance of preserving living heritage, and the role of young voices in shaping a more culturally aware future. As the lights dimmed and applause filled the hall, it was clear that the stories told on screen would continue to resonate far beyond the walls of the Rajasthan International Centre.

Rediscovering the Value of “Desi Oon”

Dr. Rena Mehta

A Varta session held on 7th May by Dr. Rena Mehta, who shared insights from her work on “Desi Oon” (indigenous wool). The session highlighted the diversity and potential of India’s pastoral wool traditions.



Prof. Mehta discussed wool from regions such as Himachal Pradesh, Rajasthan, and the Deccan, explaining how different climatic conditions produce fibres suited for uses ranging from fine textiles to carpets and industrial products. She emphasized the importance of revaluing indigenous wool as a sustainable material and a marker of cultural identity, encouraging eco-conscious design practices.

The Eternal Maze: Chakravayuh

Mr. Rajesh Kumar

A Varta titled “The Eternal Maze – Unravelling the Chakravayuh,” was led by Mr. Rajesh Kumar on 14th May. The session took students and faculty through themes of mythology, strategy, and ethics.



Mr. Kumar began with an overview of the 10 Avatars of Lord Vishnu and the 8 Chiranjeevis, highlighting their relevance to values such as purpose, duty, and identity. He then focused on the 13th day of the Mahabharata war, explaining the Chakravayuh formation and the tragic sacrifice of Abhimanyu through engaging storytelling.

Fostering Conscious Fashion

Dr. Abhishek Choudhary

As part of IICD’s Varta series, a session titled “Collaborative Consumption in Apparel” on 2nd April, led by Dr. Abhishek Choudhary,

The session addressed the environmental impact of fast fashion and introduced collaborative consumption as a sustainable alternative.



Drawing from his PhD research, Dr. Choudhary discussed consumer behavior, pre-owned apparel, and circular fashion models such as rental, swapping, and resale. He highlighted how these practices reduce waste and reshape ideas of fashion ownership, encouraging students to view sustainability as a key design principle.

The Burmandising Impact

On 30th April 2025, IICD hosted an engaging session titled “The Burmandising Impact”, led by Mr. Anuraag Singhal, author, visual merchandiser, brand and communication designer, and musician. Inspired by legendary composer R.D. Burman,



Mr. Anuraag drew parallels between musical experimentation and creative thinking in design and leadership. Through stories, musical references, and design insights, the session offered a fresh perspective on visual merchandising, customer experience, and problem-solving, encouraging participants to view challenges as opportunities for innovation..

IICD Jaipur Records Impressive Placement Outcomes Amidst a Vibrant Start to 2025

The workshop, organized in collaboration with local artisan communities and hosted amidst the serene environs of Visva-Bharati University, allowed students to engage hands-on with materials, processes, and the philosophies behind each craft.

Craft and Culture Immersion: A Journey Through Northern India

From May 4–9, 2025, 4th and 6th semester IICD Hard Material students undertook a field study across Punjab and Himachal Pradesh, exploring heritage crafts in Chandigarh, Hoshiarpur, Anandpur Sahib, and Bir through guided visits and local interactions.

They studied museum architecture, traditional metal and wood crafts, and Tibetan Buddhist metal embossing, engaging closely with artisans and communities through immersive field interactions, documentation, and reflective discussions.

Educational Exposure Visit for Empowering Women



A Life rooted in Grace, Culture, & Values



Honoring Mrs. Bimla Poddar

On May 14, we lost a visionary social worker and philanthropist in the passing of **Smt. Bimla Devi Poddar** in Varanasi. Recipient of the **Padma Shri** in 2015, and founder of **Jnana Pravaha**, a distinguished centre for cultural and civilizational studies in Varanasi, Bimla ji's work stands as one of India's most profound contributions towards the preservation of cultural heritage.

Beyond the accolades and institutions she built, were her values of devotion, perseverance and a refined sense of beauty. Her museum at Jnana Pravaha, housing textiles, antiquities, ritual objects, and art from the Poddar-Neotia collection, stands today not just as an archive, but an affirmation that heritage has a purpose only when it is consciously preserved and meaningfully shared.

Over the last 25 years of her life, Jnana Pravaha became her calling. She poured into it not the urgency of ambition, but the devotion of Seva. It was an offering to culture, to scholarship, and to its future scions. Her passing marks the end of an era, but not the extinguishing of her light. The quintessence of her values lingers gently in the institutions she created, the family she nurtured, and the countless lives
